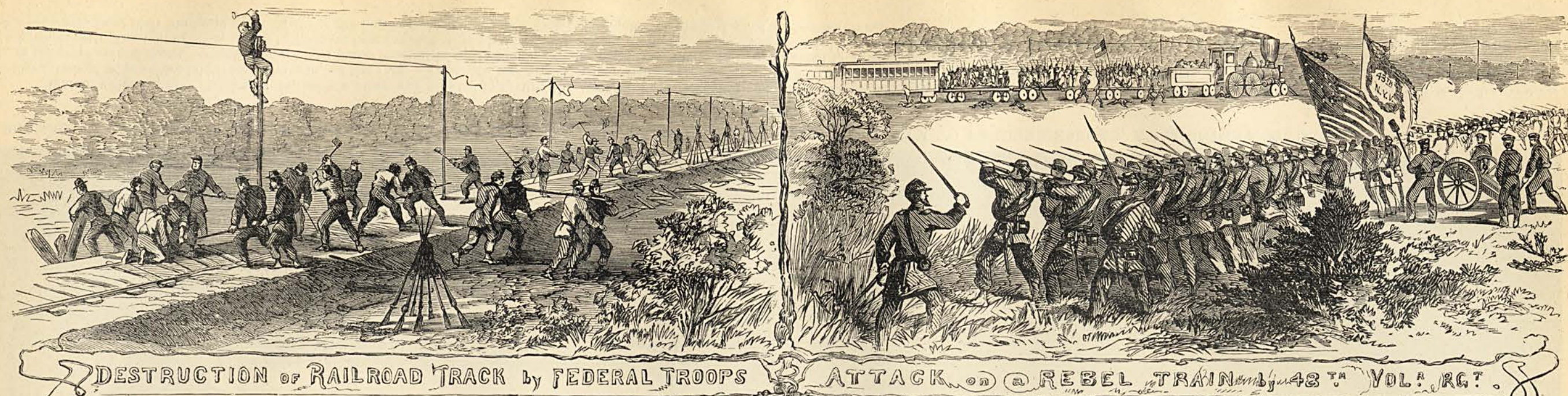




THE FEDERAL TROOPS, UNDER GENERALS BRENNAN AND TERRY, DRIVING THE CONFEDERATES, UNDER GENERAL WALKER, ACROSS THE POCOTALIGO BRIDGE, NEAR THE CHARLESTON AND SAVANNAH RAILROAD, OCTOBER 22, 1862.—FROM A SKETCH BY W. T. CRANE.

The above series of pictures represent scenes in the successful expedition of General Brennan against the Charleston and Savannah Railroad. The troops engaged in the spirited attack upon a train loaded with Confederate soldiers and manned with two field guns, belonged to the Forty-eighth New York (Perry's Saints). After the retreat of the train, the soldiers destroyed the railway track. Generals Brennan and Terry were at the same time engaged with a superior force of Confederates at Pocotaligo Swamp. By a skillful flank movement of the Union infantry, the enemy was driven from his strong position on the high ground above the morass, and over the causeway in hasty retreat.
