



COLD HARBOR, THE SCENE OF STONEWALL JACKSON'S FLANK MOVEMENT AND OF GRANT'S OPERATIONS.—FROM A SKETCH BY EDWIN FORBES.

The first battle of Cold Harbor was fought June 27, 1862, when McClellan was on the Peninsula trying to get to Richmond. The second was fought June 1, 1864, when Grant's forces were moving southeast toward the James. The significance of the name of this place has been much discussed. It is an old English term, meaning a house of entertainment where travelers can be provided with shelter, but not with fire.
