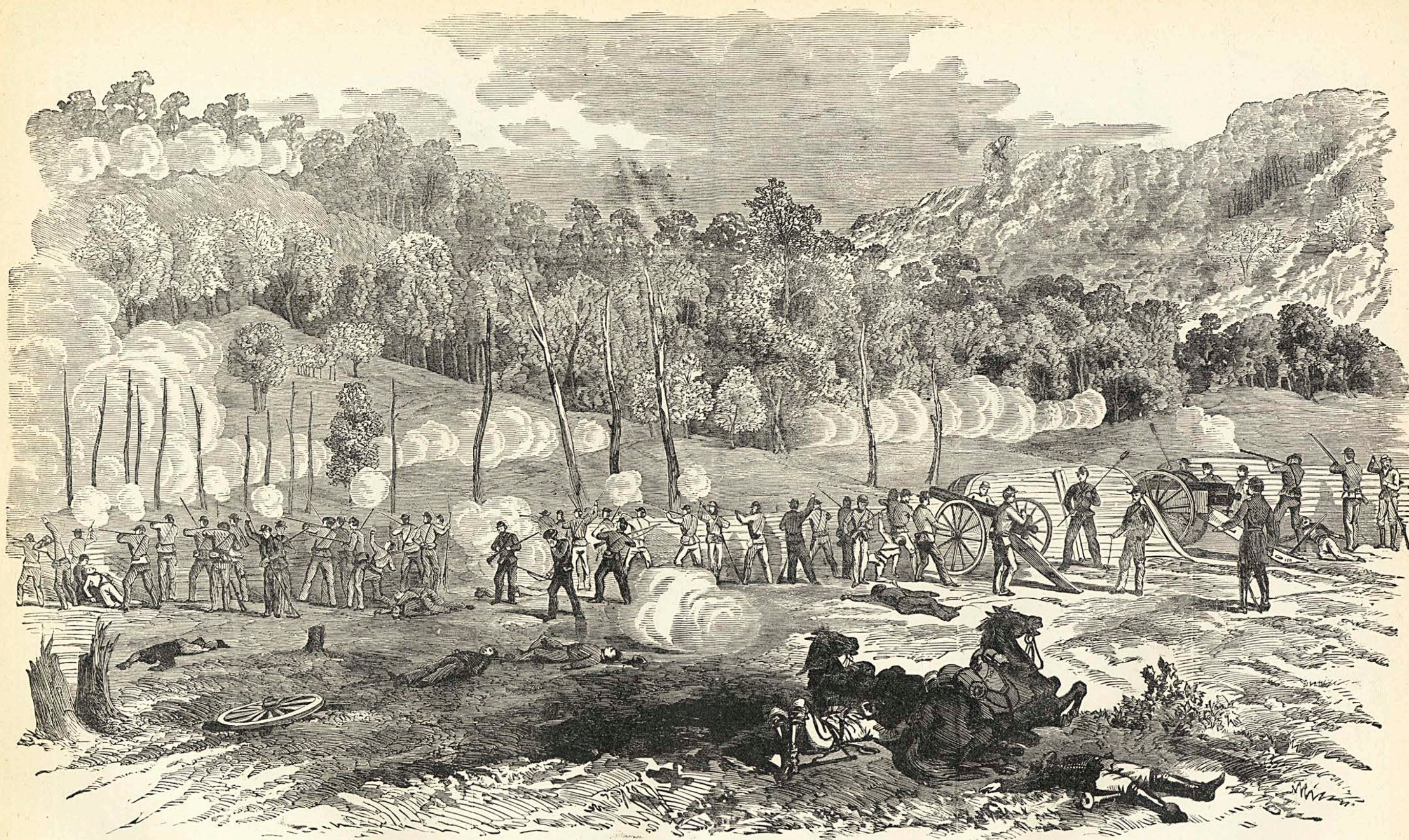




ENGAGEMENT AT KULP HOUSE, JUNE 22, 1864, IN SHERMAN'S ATLANTA CAMPAIGN.—THE FEDERAL ARTILLERY DRIVING HOOD'S MEN BACK TO THEIR EARTHWORKS.

At the Kulp House, three miles from Marietta, Ga., on June 22, 1864. Hood's corps attacked that part of Sherman's line which was held by Hooker and Schofield, and serious fighting ensued, which resulted in the complete repulse of Hood, who left about 200 of his dead on the field. At this time Sherman said, in one of his dispatches: "Our lines are now in close contact, and the fighting is incessant, with a good deal of artillery fire. As fast as we gain one position the enemy has another all ready, but I think he will soon have to let go Kenesaw, which is the key to the whole country."
